### Faith Formation Commission

#### Report from Rachael Groark & Nicole Hardie, Co-Chairs

The Faith Formation Commission was revitalized at the start of 2023. We aim to bring new energy and connection to the Parish through the centralization of existing efforts and identification and execution of new programs. In 2022, we collected feedback through the Synod & Ministry Fair and were able to reach 100+ parishioners. We identified 4 main areas of focus for this commission (in addition to sacramental prep):

Socialization Opportunities – Family movie nights, teen movie nights and parents night out. These events were paired with a Mass for the appropriate audience and have been well-received. Please continue to join us for these connection points monthly throughout the school year.

Access to Father – Wine & Cheese was offered throughout the year, with Father in attendance as able. We are looking forward to continuing to offer this event monthly in the coming year.

Education - Speaker Series (primarily featuring Ron Ryan in 2023), support for Children's Liturgy of the Word and Agape Immersive Service Learning for families and teens.

Affinity/Interest Groups – These are self-managed small groups focused on common interests such as a book club and The Chosen video series.

Thank you to all of the volunteers who helped us to add new connection points throughout last year. We are so looking forward to carrying these programs forward in 2024!

## Finance Council

#### Report from Frank Feeman, Chair

On Behalf of the Finance Council: As Father and Joe Sullivan have explained in their letters, the Synod process held in the Spring of 2022, the new Faith Formation Commission's efforts, as well as our community's response have resulted in improved financial performance and, more importantly, have energized St. John!

Parish Operating Revenues increased in 2023 to \$844,000.

For the first time since 2018, Collection Revenues increased from \$749,000 to \$783,000.

Revenues from bequests were \$4,000 more than 2022.

Overall fees were less than the prior year.

Due to increases in interest rates, interest income increased by \$14,000.

Once again, we exceeded our Parish goal for the Annual Catholic Appeal which provided funding to support the 2022/2023 budget.

Operating expenses increased in 2023 from 2022 by \$53,000. Market level increases in salaries were made. Interest rates on borrowings increased. Assessments, insurance, and other costs also increased. Additional costs were incurred for Faith Formation activities. The increase in participation and improved Collections demonstrate that the investment in Faith Formation activities was wise.

Payments of \$45,000 were made on the Parish's 30-year loan from the Parish Revolving Fund. The budgeted payments are more than the amounts required and should result in paying off the loan ahead of schedule. However, it is possible that the rates of interest on the loan will increase as inflation and higher interest rates continue.

The Parish balance sheet, which is included in the Annual Report, reflects adequate cash reserves. We must remember that during July through early October 2023, the new ventilation system for the School Building was completed and will cost about \$1.5 million. As of June 30, 2023, \$425,000 has been paid. So, roughly \$1,100,000 will be paid through completion of the project, reducing our cash reserves. Although lower, the remaining cash balances are still adequate to provide capital for the funding of our Parish and School. However, as I have said each year for some time, we must keep in mind that our wonderful facilities require improvements and important maintenance, and more capital will be required.

In addition to payments for the new School Ventilation Project, the remaining costs of the Egan Hall Fire System and new bleachers were paid. Total payments for HVAC, Bleachers, Egan Fire system and other fixed assets were \$577,000.

Operating cash flows of the Parish and School were enough to cover loan payments and part of the payments for fixed assets. Cash reserves were used to pay the remaining fixed asset costs. Our cash balances decreased by \$326,000 to \$2,512,000 on June 30, 2023, from \$2,838,000 on June 30, 2022.

Increased inflation will result in higher costs in the future. Our Parish depends on our generosity. Let us continue the great work of our Parish that has been renewed by the Synod process. Please keep our Parish and School in your Prayers and generously support this Fall's sacrificial giving campaign.






